Il Filo della Storia - The Thread of History

Via XX Settembre, 132 | Conegliano

Pedestrian tourist itinerary in the historic centre of Conegliano.

Il Filo della Storia (The Thread of History) is a walking itinerary in the historic centre of Conegliano, designed and promoted by the Lions Club of Conegliano. Twenty-four information panels in Italian and English have been positioned at as many points of interest, to accompany visitors on a pleasant walk of about four kilometres. To follow the Thread of History, simply follow the red line drawn on the streets of the centre.

Opening hours: every second and fourth Sunday of the month, from 10 a.m. to 12 a.m., guided tours are organised along the route, with a participation fee of €5 per person (for information and bookings, please contact the IAT Office at 0438 21230 or send an e-mail to iat@comune.conegliano.tv.it).

Moriago della Battaglia



Walk in Mosnigo, I Palù area

Naturalistic itinerary to the Palù di Mosnigo | Moriago della Battaglia. The itinerary starts at the church of Mosnigo, which dates back to 1590. Leaving the church behind, continue along via Chiesa, turn right into via Don Tarcisio Salton and right again into via Todoverto to enter the Palù park, crossing country roads. The Palù area is a unique natural park, where you can see alders, oaks, willows, hazels and plane trees. The Benedictine monks, later followed by the Cistercians and the Camaldolese, reclaimed the area in the 1300s. After about 200 metres, turn right at the crossroads and continue as far as an old washhouse and keeping to the left, continue towards Col San Martino. Follow the same route back to the starting point. This itinerary can be completed throughout the year, is appropriate for everyone and has a duration of about one hour, depending on the route chosen.

Refrontolo



Walk in Refrontolo

A walk through the village of Refrontolo, with views of the Treviso Pre-Alps and hills. Leaving your car in the main square of Refrontolo, near the town hall, you can walk along the pedestrian path, following the signs for the "Tempietto Spada". In this way, you reach the hillock of the small temple from which you can admire the frame of

the Treviso Pre-Alps. Continue along the small road in the direction of the town centre, passing by the parish church of Santa Margherita, which contains some suggestive altarpieces. Continuing in the direction of the square, you pass by the ancient Spada barchessa. To complete the visit, you cannot miss a stop at the Molinetto della Croda, which can be reached on foot or by car (about 1.6 km). The Molinetto, dating back to the first half of the 1600s, is still in operation and can be visited inside.

The walk takes about an hour and is appropriate for everyone (some stretches are uphill).

San Pietro di Feletto



Walk in San Pietro di Feletto

Via Roncalli, 1 | San Pietro di Feletto

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A walk in San Pietro di Feletto, following the course of the Crevada stream. The walk starts from the square in front of the Pieve di San Pietro, where you can see a notice board illustrating the routes. Descending towards the Crevada torrent, heading south, walk along the Val Trippera, an area rich in caves and natural caverns, until you arrive in the territory of Refrontolo. At the ruins of the former Molino Crevada, ascend towards Borgo Anese, an ancient court of houses of great charm. The toponym recalls those who worked wool in the 1300s. The oratory is dedicated to San Giovanni Battista, the protector of wool workers. Continue over the provincial road towards the hamlet of Castagnè, past the hamlet of Frare and back to the square of San Pietro, where you can relax in a quiet park with children's playground and picnic area. From the torrent, a branch-off goes up towards borgo Frare, creating a shorter hiking loop. The walk has a duration of about one and a half hours.



Pope Giovanni XXIII trail

Via Roncalli, 1 | San Pietro di Feletto

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A 4-kilometre trail in the hills of San Pietro di Feletto.

Inaugurated in 2019, this short path unfolds in the hills of San Pietro di Feletto. It is dedicated to Pope John XXIII, who as a young man loved to come to the Feletto area for his summer holidays and who used to walk here among chestnut trees, hornbeams and vines. The trail starts from the Antica Pieve, near which stands the Villa Patriarcale, where the future Pope used to reside during his stays in the village, and then descends along Via Roncalli and towards the Roccolo. The route continues through the green hills, letting you admire the Manzana dorsal and the hill of Formeniga, on whose summit stands the church of San Pancrazio. In the background, from left to right, the hills of Tarzo and Vittoriese with the Treviso Pre-Alps in the background: Col Visentin, the cut of Val Lapisina, Mount Pizzoc and Cansiglio. Towards the east, the eastern Veneto and Friuli plains extend. It is a rural landscape, in which vineyard cultivations alternates with patches of forest and small villages. One of these is the famous "Muro di Ca' del Poggio", a demanding climb, internationally renowned in the world of cycling, near which the path of Pope Giovanni XXIII takes the '100 steps' route, a prelude to returning to the starting point. The itinerary is marked by specific signs.

Sernaglia della Battaglia





via Busche, 101 | Sernaglia della Battaglia

This area of approximately 1,000 hectares, between the municipalities of Sernaglia, Moriago, Vidor and Farra di Soligo, recalls the ancient presence of a marshy area with the toponym "Palù".

The marshes, which were transformed into grassland plots bordered by ditches and perimeter hedges as windbreaks following reclamation in the Middle Ages, allowed the area to be used for the production of fodder, timber and firewood.

The Palù represent one of the best-preserved closed-field areas in Veneto and northern Italy: orchid and iris blooms can be observed in the wet patches, while specimens of farnias and native oaks can be admired in the hedges and wooded patches. The municipality, in collaboration with the Veneto Region and Gal 4, has equipped guided ecological trails, to be taken on foot, horseback or mountain bike, that cross the entire area of the Palù del Quartier del Piave.



Fontane Bianche ecological path

via Fontigo, 37 | Sernaglia della Battaglia

The area of the Fontane Bianche ecological route covers more than 100 hectares and from a geomorphological point of view is located just above the confluence of the Soligo river, its last tributary before the Piave flows into the Veneto plain below. The Legambiente circle of Sernaglia della Battaglia has taken over, under concession from the Genio Civile di Treviso, a 26-hectare plot of land in the heart of the Fontane Bianche area in which there is a dense and well-preserved floodplain woodland characterised by resurgences and pools of water. A nature trail has been set up within the wood, where it is possible to admire the most suggestive corners of this place, such as the Observatory and the Volpere Peninsula, and to study the many different floristic and faunal emergencies present there.



Volpere Trail

The Volpere nature trail and itinerary, promoted by the Legambiente Sernaglia club, runs from Passo Barca di Falzé di Piave along the left bank of the river to the confluence with Fontane Bianche and then continues at the foot of the rocky escarpment. The naturalistic peculiarity is the striking conglomerate wall, a rock consisting of heterogeneous pebbles held together by a calcium carbonate matrix. The importance of the site is also derived from the presence of settlements dating back to the Mesolithic age, as evidenced by the discovery of lithic artefacts from the period. The area has maintained its historical significance even in more recent times, thanks to the presence of the "Passo Barca" (a connection point between the right and left banks of the river) active until the 1970s. The route is very simple, also appropriate for families with children, but overall it is 11 km long, as it connects two different routes.
